

## Advanced Placement Program (AP)

The earning of Advanced Placement (AP) credit while in high school can be a valuable piece to the progress a student makes toward his or her academic program of study. . .

A student from a high school that offers college-level courses through the College Entrance Examination Board, Advanced Placement Program, may be given university credit at the University of North Dakota (UND) and/or advanced standing in particular subject areas.

### How AP Works. . .

- Under the AP Program, a student enrolls in a course (while in high school) designated as Advanced Placement. Upon completion of the AP course, the student takes an examination which is then scored by the College Board. The student may elect to have his or her AP score sent to a number of colleges or universities. The official score must be sent directly from the College Board to the colleges or universities chosen by the student. Some students choose not to have their AP exam result sent to colleges or universities until after they have received the result themselves. If that is the case, a student would then need to contact College Board directly, to request to have his or her AP exam result sent to UND. Advanced Placement scores typically arrive at UND one month after the exam has been evaluated by the College Board.

- Based on the score obtained on the final AP examination, a student is potentially eligible for college credit. Once the AP score is received by UND, the course is posted to a student's academic transcript according to credit earned.

### AP and UND. . .

The University of North Dakota offers college credit for a variety of Advanced Placement Program exam subject areas. The back of this sheet outlines the AP exams for which UND awards credit, along with the equivalent UND course and credit hours earned.

## Advanced Placement (AP) Credit

Under Policy 403.7.4, the North Dakota University System Academic Affairs Council has adopted the following guidelines for minimum AP examination scores. The required minimum credit-granting scores, number of semester hours of credit to be granted, and specific course equivalents are listed below.
